IN THE RED

hen you think of holidays, what pops into your head? Halloween? New Year's Eve? Your birthday? Christmas, Easter, Holy Week? All of us have our favorite holiday. For some, it may be because your family celebrated all of them in a big way. Maybe some of them are special to you because of a personal connection. Maybe you're tired of holidays and the commercialization that has happened to them. You throw your hands up in the air, and say, "Is nothing sacred anymore?" Yes, some things do need to be set apart and kept holy. The Holy Week Experience (THWE) helps us to do just that for the final days of Christ's life.

Most Christians know the story of the days leading up to Easter; in fact, many feel they can't get to Easter without traveling through Good Friday. But, for many, the true story of Easter is out of context. There is lack of understanding of why Christ-followers get more excited about Easter than about Christmas. Or, maybe, there is a need to make that personal connection of Holy Week to your LIFEjourney with Christ. The Holy Week Experience will fill that need.

On Thursday, April 13 and Friday, April 14, we'll set the stage for Easter with The Holy Week Experience: In the Red. Fully immersing us in the days leading up to Easter, you'll be transported to the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem as the people greeted him with song. Their hearts were open and their love was red in anticipation of the Savior that God had promised. We'll quickly move through the events of the week, as Jesus shares the intimacy of The Lord's Supper with all of us. Judas will be caught red-handed and Jesus fulfills the prophecy made long ago in the Old Testament. Constant in his purpose and set on reclaiming what was once lost, Jesus fervently pressed on in the red. Though the sum was great, he paid it all when he willingly went to the cross.

THWE: In the Red will focus on the last week of Jesus' life utilizing creative elements in this experiential service. THWE ends with Good Friday–Jesus's death on the cross and being laid in the tomb. This year, we'll conclude the service at the cemetery as we grieve like those who were with Jesus on that final day.

During the next few weeks as we enter into Lent, we're asking for you to be in prayer. There are people you know who need to be nudged and encouraged on their faith walk. Pray for them now. Pray for you to have the courage to invite them to THWE: In the Red. Pray for their hearts to open to experience the love Jesus has for them-for all of us.

CAN WE TRULY MAKE A DIFFERENCE IN OUR COMMUNITY?

ell, that's a great question, and we first need to identify what success looks like here in West County. As I was researching "community development" in preparation to write this piece, I came across story after story of social justice agencies working to improve communities in third world countries. In each story, these agencies developed partnerships with the local governments and businesses, implemented a unified plan that was to be carried out with the natives, and resulted in the percentage of households reporting positive change in income rising from 26% to 84% (and other similar statistics). Praise God! Another example was in rural Colorado, where a town went from having an unemployment rate of 60% down to 42% with some targeted programming and training. Again, praise God!

While this is a huge win for these communities, this has absolutely nothing to do with us! This does not need to be the focus here in West County, as we live in an area of affluence. There are plenty of people here who struggle to pay bills and find themselves in tremendous debt, but the economic need is just not the same here. We don't struggle with water contamination, we don't struggle with rampant disease from poor hygiene, we don't struggle with energy deficiency, and we definitely don't struggle from a lack of food or shelter.

So what do we struggle with here in West County, with our agonizing quest for our long overdue car upgrade, with our painstaking struggle of identifying tonight's restaurant of choice, and with our grueling debate over cable or DirectTV (or Netflix)? What about isolation? What about pride, and an overreliance on ourselves? What about a deep soul sickness that stems from constantly lacking... something? I would argue that the biggest need here in West County is a lack of true connection, both with other people and, ultimately, with our Creator.

So...can we truly make a difference? Let's jump back to where we started, to "community development". The United Nations defines community development as, "a process where community members come together to take collective action and generate solutions to common problems." I love that. When I think of what God has called me to do with my position here at St. John, this statement is basically it. I believe that I am called to St. John to help "community members come together to take collective action and generate solutions to common problems." That's a lofty statement, but here are some ways that we can make this happen.

This is going to sound elementary, but if the problem in our community is a lack of connection, then let's create opportunities for people to connect. I believe that people who are born again through the death and resurrection of Jesus have an enhanced ability, realized or not, to truly connect with people on the deepest of levels. I'm not saying it's inherent, I believe it takes work to realize and release this. However, the fact that the Holy Spirit, God himself, dwells in us certainly gives us an edge. Our church is incredible at creating opportunities for us to connect with other members, as well as folks within our community, and I believe our reach is fairly wide. I know, because I've heard through our focus groups, that so far it hasn't been enough. There are still tens of thousands of people here who aren't connecting with their Father. All this means for us is that West County is ripe with opportunity for us to pursue people like never before, and in order to make that happen, we need to be partnering with people and organizations in our community that can help us reach those that have so far been missed for numerous reasons. And you know what the best part is? You can do be doing this of your own accord, and many of you are! Many of you have already started conversations with organizations that align with your passions, or you've found ways to serve that connect you with people you would never have met otherwise. Thank you for being ambassadors of St. John!

Many of us want to be plugged into our community like this, but so many things keep us from making that commitment. We have jobs, we have kids, we have sports, we have hobbies, we have houses, we have cars, we have workouts, and all of these things require time. If that's you, and you've been wanting to plug into our community and have just been too busy, I would just encourage you to think about it. Think about where your skills and your passions intersect, and find a way to do that, whatever that is, here in West County. What you want to do may seem insignificant, but you have to remember that this is "a process where community members come together to take collective action and generate solutions to common problems." You won't be alone.

Imagine, for a moment, this incredible vision. Imagine if every board of directors, every sports league, every bingo group, every bird watching club, every parks and recreation committee, and every networking group had one St. John member in it. Now imagine that those St. John members are using their skills and passions to connect with people and, ultimately, help connect those people to Jesus. Finally, just imagine how much community development could happen if God's people, the ones who have a special ability to connect people to their Father, are being influencers at every level in West County and are working together to address this "soul sickness". It's a very lofty goal, and I am 100% confident that I can't do it alone. However, with your help, with the help of the incredibly supportive St. John staff, and with God's favor, I know we can make a difference.

STUDENT MINISTRY: THE INVALUABLE MENTOR

he word mentor can be used as both a noun and a verb. To get us started let me give you the dictionary definition that I made up because the real dictionary definition was boring. A mentor is a super incredible Jesus warrior that uses their powers of patience, love, and limited understanding of social media to help students know Jesus better. See, isn't that better than "an experienced adviser"?

What Pua and I do in Student Ministry here wouldn't work without our mentors. Many churches simply call them small group leaders, but that sells them way short. Our Student Ministry mentors know their students, they play games with them, they attend their sports games, they watch their dances and theatre performances. Mentors take their difficult questions; they are there for both good and bad times as another consistent positive adult influence. Mentors encourage, love, disciple, and celebrate students. Finally, they lead small group (which is also an extremely important thing). Basically, mentors mentor and that's why we need them.

To help me write this I asked one of our seventh grade guy mentors, Scott Morris, to tell me about his group this year. He began where I expect any guy mentor to start: friendly competition over games. Now while it's not normally our girls who come up with the "let's see who can run into the couch the fastest game," middle school guys love their competition over insignificant games. His group connects over competition. Whether it is a made up game, pool, foosball, ping pong, or a group game during Core, it gives them energy and starts the morning off right. Scott tells me he remains undefeated in foosball (but he hasn't played me yet.) What he said next was gold, "Honestly, my biggest goal each and every week is for the boys to want to come back next week." Scott is someone who gets it, because relationships develop over time and Student Ministry is all about relationships. Everyone, whether it's a good one or a bad one, has a relationship with God, other people, and themselves. For our Student Ministry to be holistic, we have to develop all of these in a healthy and truthful way.

One thing I love about small groups is that they create a safe environment for students to talk through deep thoughts as well as build the kind of relationships where they feel known. Scott's words here were strong so let me share them directly.

"We work through the discussion questions but really try to freestyle so it doesn't feel like school or that they are being forced to learn. We also try to really point out what each person does well. Some pray unbelievably well. Some are very knowledgeable about the Bible. Some are quick to look things up and like to read to the group. Some ask great questions. Whatever the gift or contribution, we lavish the praise and try to draw their contributions out. If someone has a really challenging question or expresses doubt or confusion on their faith, we really encourage that, too. We want the kids to know that it is the only way to learn and that it's important to verbalize these doubts if they have them."

Is that not incredible? How would your faith be strengthened if every time you had a hard question or a doubt about something, you had a small group of people to discuss and find the answer with that wouldn't judge, but encourage you? That's what is happening in Scott's and our other small groups. He says, "When someone is really struggling with a spiritual issue, that's when you know they were paying attention and God is at work on them." Student Ministry here at St. John wouldn't be the same without our mentors. Mentors mentor, and that makes a huge difference.

t is a cold morning in the middle of winter. You go out of bed and walk across the hallway to wake up your kids for school. You go downstairs to ge breakfast ready and tell everyone to come eat-it the same sugary, non-nutritional breakfast they't had for weeks. You were trying to save money whe you could. After you put their dishes in the sink, you throw on a coat and some winter boots and open the front door to go heat up the car. As you open the front door, there is a slip of paper with the word "Eviction Notice" on one side. Your heart immediated breaks...you'd been anxiously waiting for this day but you never really thought it would come. You immediately feel disbelief, despair, and fear.

What is your next step? You first consider the realit of your situation. Your employer laid you off a couple of months ago and you put off finishing you degree when your children were born because thei needs came first. You've tirelessly been putting in applications and attending interviews to no avail. Y aren't eligible for unemployment yet because the company who let you go paid you severance (whic you used to keep the water and electric on for a couple of months). Your oldest child's GPA is at the top of her class and she loves the friends she's made at school, you don't want to leave the district.

Unfortunately, your landlord has given you a coupl of weeks to move out. Where will you go? How are you going to lift the heavy furniture on your own? You had to quit getting your Cortisone shots for yo knees because when you lost your job, you lost you insurance. Your closest family member is your fathe and you don't want to inconvenience him. Besides, senior living apartment isn't equipped to squeeze three more people. Your friends have no idea what going on with you financially and they've already done enough. Anyways, it's West County. "Can't yo just go get a hotel room or something until you fin a new place?" Well not really. When you have bad credit due to outstanding credit cards and student loans, apartment complex managers tend to deny your applications. That could be one very lengthy expensive hotel stay.

You decide you'll call around to seek public assistant You begin Googling public assistance programs and most of them serve within St. Louis City zip codes only. The St. Louis County program you find says you won't receive financial assistance of any sort for at least three months. You try one last place after making what feels like 10,000 phone calls. The age
